It needs home work of knowing your market and product. Start on a small scale, use WhatsApp/Facebook/Instagram for marketing and you will be on a business road.

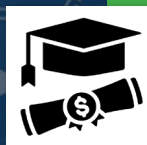
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### Teaching and Tutoring
